# Parking Annual Monitoring Report 2018/19

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### Introduction

Southwark Council has monitored the delivery of the Transport Plan 2011 for the duration of the plan and monitoring concluded with the Transport Plan 2011 Annual Monitoring Report 2017/18 which is publicly available on the Transport Policy webpage. The financial year 2018/19 has been a transition year where Southwark Council adopted the Movement Plan in April 2019 and Annual Monitoring of the Movement Plan will be available after autumn 2020.

The Annual Monitoring Reports included parking and funding data which will be included in future Movement Plan Annual Monitoring Reports from 2019/20. This document will cover parking and funding data during the transition year.

## **Parking**

Parking controls are required in order to allocate space fairly and are an important traffic demand management tool, improving safety, accessibility, servicing, and ensuring appropriate use of the highway network. Enforcement activity aims to keep traffic moving, minimise obstructions, safety hazards and encourage compliance with the regulations. 2018/19 represented the 24th year of decriminalised parking and traffic enforcement in Southwark

#### 24 years of decriminalised parking & traffic enforcement in Southwark




Figure 1. Total of PCNs issued in the past 24 years of decriminalised parking & traffic enforcement in Southwark (Source: Southwark Council)




Figure 2. Total of PCNs issued (Source: Southwark Council)




Figure 3. Total of PCNs issued by area (Source: Southwark Council)




Figure 4. Number of PCNs issued by contravention type (Source: Southwark Council)

Figure 4 sets out the number of PCNs issued for the last five years by contravention type. There are three types of contravention:

- PCNs for parking contraventions, by CCTV and by CEO's.
- PCNs for bus lane contraventions by CCTV.
- PCNs for moving traffic contraventions by CCTV




Figure 5. Number of PCNs issued by charge band. (Source: Southwark Council)




Figure 6 Number of PCNs issued by source last five years. (Source: Southwark Council)




Figure 7. Number of PCNs issued by outcome. (Source: Southwark Council)

#### Highways vehicle removals




Figure 8. Number of vehicles removed in Public Highways. (Source: Southwark Council)

## **Funding**

Like many other organisations, the council has been operating on reduced funding and increased costs. While we work hard to find smarter ways of working, less resources have an impact on what can be achieved.

Southwark Council's key sources of funding for the Movement Plan include TfL, planning obligations (section 106) and the council's own budget. This work includes the borough's improvement programme, major schemes, parking, maintenance and highway asset programs.

The level of charges associated with PCNs and clamp/removal fees are set by London Councils with the approval of the Mayor of London. These are reviewed every four years. The tables below set out the income generated through parking services and the cost to run the service. The surplus is reinvested in the highway network with 75 per cent of this spent on highway maintenance, with the balance spent on supporting borough wide measures including road safety
